Merry Christmas and happy New Year! God's blessings to you as we celebrate Christmas and enter 2017. Each year when I watch children present the Christmas story, I am reminded no matter how familiar that wonderful story is there is always a newness we can find if we are willing to look at it through different eyes. When we really look at the Christmas story and what it means, we not only see the excitement of the season, but we also can get a new perspective – a perspective of Christmas hope.

During Advent we have been considering what Christmas hope means and how it is revealed in the world. Christmas hope isn't just a nostalgic, wistful part of the season, but a powerful, new perspective God offers in Christ. If we look at Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the wise men we can see important lessons about hope including:

- □We find hope when we have faith in God. Having faith in God means being led by the hope God gives rather than the fear and anxiety the world builds.
- □Having hope doesn't mean life is easy, but it does mean we know God is at work and offering new life amidst challenges.
- □We can choose to have a hopeless or a hope-filled perspective. God doesn't force hope upon us.
- □We find hope when we open ourselves to the new ways in which God wants us to serve God, and respond to God's call saying "Here I am, Lord."
- □Hope is like an ANT a little bit goes a long ways.
- □ANT = be Available to God, open to New things that God is doing, and Trust in God.
- □Finding hope sometimes requires us to step outside of our comfort zone, take risks for our faith, and be willing to see the world in a different way.
- □In God there is always hope.

I pray that as the world continues to live out its typical turmoil, we as individuals and as a congregation embody the faith and hope that brings peace and life. Be mindful of what you are being led by as you live out your daily life. Renew in your heart the promise and hope of God as revealed in the birth of Christ, and let this be your guide as you journey in a jumpy world. Look at life and the world with a perspective of Christmas hope. Let's be excited about 2017, because we know God is with us and as we live in faith together God can and will do wonderful things through us. May we shine together radiating a Christmas light that dispels darkness.

SPREAD CHRISTMAS JOY INSTEAD OF SEASONAL STRESS!

Christmas time can be so stressful with all that we try to do. The high expectations we have for events and activities also add stress to a season that is supposed to be joy filled. Being in a life changing situation such as dealing with serious illness, the loss of a loved one, job change... can be stressful on its own, and adding all of the memories and expectations of the season can make it difficult for people to know the true peace and joy of Christmas. Below are some simple things we can do to help spread Christmas joy, instead of adding to seasonal stress!

- □Allow a parent and young child to go ahead of you in a shopping line.
- □Smile! Even when you feel harried and tired, remember the joy of knowing Christ and share it by simply smiling.
- □Be sure to put quiet "God time" in your week.
- □Offer to help carry bag(s) for someone.
- □Pray for people you know are struggling with the season. Call or send a note letting them know you are praying for them. Rather than focusing on the holiday season in your communication, focus on God's love in Christ for them. "Christmas Season" brings with it a lot of memories and expectations, but God's love in Christ goes beyond and opens the door to new hope and new life.
- □Help someone struggling with the holidays by doing a simple holiday event with them. Activities like a Christmas Coffee outing or a Card signing get-together can become a meaningful part of the season.
- □Talk to people you know who are struggling.

 Don't be afraid to approach them because you are concerned you might say the wrong thing. Silence and avoidance say a lot more than we think. There isn't always a need to talk about difficult issues, but interest shown in someone's life says volumes about how we care.

PRAYER ~ PICNIC ~ PARABLE ~ PROMISE



Personal and global understanding is growing in the knowledge of these things: Life is interwoven, reality is a web of interrelated influences, and that what we do to a part we do to the whole. In response, some of the world's mightiest political, commercial and even religious forces oppose recognition and demand denial of the forces of change on our climate, on our scientific understanding, on the movements of refugee peoples, and on making racial justice a reality among us. That opposition is given new voice and force in the political positions taken and administrative appointments made by leaders of the incoming administration.

These are big problems; with others, I ask myself big questions. "How, as Christians, can we give prophetic voice to this new con-

sciousness in the face of these opposition forces instead of being passively unrelated to them, hide from them or drift into accepting them as the new normal?" In response, I hear, "Start small; begin close to your heart." The deep spiritual wisdom of Christianity begins in self-examination and a clear-eyed look at reality by posing discerning questions. These are among my favorites: What is true? What do I love? What do I want?

What is true? A widely-held, conventional view of Christianity is that Jesus is irrelevant to the very real human social and political problems and environmental pressures we now face. In that view the Gospel message is seen to be only about the soul, it's guilt before God, and its redemption through Jesus' Passion into the afterlife. All of it, sometimes referred to as atonement theology, is one layer of the Christian story that most often comes to mind when people see the Cross. It is a valuable layer of Jesus' story, but not the only story we tell.

What do I love? I love the Christian story centered on Jesus whose teachings show that compassion, empathy and connection are central; that matter matters and the earth requires our surrender to its needs; that salvation comes only with one another, not in separation from one another no matter the forces dividing us, and that Jesus reveals God's self-giving, vulnerable love is at the heart of everything.

What do I want? I want new ways to symbolize the complex layers of the Gospel story and especially that God's self-giving, vulnerable love is at the heart of everything. That self-giving, vulnerable love that always, always propelled Jesus, in whose name we live, to the margins to care for those in need and into the middle, into the fray of political and religious disputes, to challenge the status quo of power and privilege and ask the parable question, "What if....?"

Two or three years ago I purchased the necklace pictured above from Duluth artist, Gail Blum. I learned the power of new symbols to evoke a fresh telling of the story of living in the way of Jesus. When wearing my necklace it invited and provoked heart-felt conversations. The welcoming heart is brassy, bold, open, imbalanced, imperfect, daring and ready to show-up, because it is secure. It is anchored in and rises through billion -year-old gray basalt from the shores of Lake Superior, a rock of ages, my Ebenezer—rock that helps, rock that stabilizes, that anchors, that is my point of safety and home, that will not be moved, unchanging. It is around my neck whenever I lead worship.

Right here, where we are, at Pilgrim, we are telling the story of how God's self-giving, vulnerable love is at the heart of everything. Here among our own Beloved community we can look for and we will find refreshed sacred symbols for our times, for ways to tell ancient stories of the patterns of Truth and Spirit which we have promised to give a living voice in time, a time of unique and demanding challenge. This time to which we are called to be the realm of God.


WOULD YOU LIKE TO BE A SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHER?
